As we look back we realized the Museum had another successful year in 2018. Faithful Museum Supporters made it possible. We had about the same number of visitors but updated and added to the exhibits. Several duplicate and surplus exhibits were auctioned off or traded off. Outright sale of the duplicate steam tractor was made to another steam tractor enthusiast who plans to put it back into running condition. Would you like a yard ornament? We are offering (free) this old 'fine seed drill' on a first come-first serve basis.



It is about 8-10 feet wide with a wood box. Some of the name/label painted on the back is still legible.

Several new (old) items have been added. One is a 1945 Case Tractor. It has a note on it to use 20-50 cylinder oil! It was a contribution from John Shukis who also contributed a Minniapolis-Moline "Z". Both are in reasonably good running

condition. Below is a picture of the Case with President Lee Heckart in the drivers seat. We have a lot of "old Stuff"...just like a real Museum! See this old safe. It likely dates back to the first bank in Harrisburg.

But we just have the last bank: "Citizens Bank". The display data board is shown also.



We plan to remove the flooring and wall board and some of the window trim, restoring these with material that more closely resemble the original.

Our attendance this year totals 750-800. This is after adding a "preacher count" to the 4th July attendance where only 4 visitors signed in. They came from 19 states ranging from California to New York and from 6 countries.
